Detained Indians released in Kabul

People tracking the developments in Kabul said there were no specific reports of any harm to Indians in Kabul so far

towards the Kabul airport when they were stopped by Taliban fighters, according to Afghan media reports.

Kabul Now news portal initially reported that the party was "abducted" by the Taliban fighters but it later updated the report saying all the people were released and, on their way,

back to the Kabul airport. The people cited above said the Indians were taken away for questioning and it is not unusual under the current circumstances. There was no immediate official comment or reaction on the matter. Meanwhile, India on Saturday evacuated around 80 Indian nationals from Kabul by a transport military aircraft by the Indian Air Force. The aircraft landed at Fushanbe in Tajikistan after evacuating the Indians from Kabul, they said, adding it is expected to arrive at Hindon airbase near Delhi in the evening.

IN ONE VIDEO, a Taliban official reassured female health workers that they could keep their jobs. In another, militants told the Sikhs, a minority religious group, that they were free and protected. Still others suggested a new law in Kabul, with Taliban fighters holding looters and thieves at gunpoint.

The Taliban, who banned the internet the first time they controlled Afghanistan, have turned social media into a powerful tool to tame opposition and broadcast their messages. Now firmly in control of the country, they are using thousands of Twitter accounts — some official and others anonymous — to placate Afghanistan's terrified but increasingly tech-savvy urban base.

The images of peace and stability projected by the Taliban contrast sharply with the scenes broadcast around the world of the chaotic American evacuation from the Kabul airport and of women of protesters being beaten and shot. They demonstrated the digital powers the militants have gained over years of insurgency, offering a glimpse of how the Taliban could use those tools to lure Afghanistan, even as they cling to their fundamentalist religious tenets and a poor productivity.

An Afghan social media site became a viral indicator of public sentiment. Many of the Taliban's critics and supporters of the US-backed government have gone underground. But already, with a social media campaign in recent weeks that Afghan security forces to put down their weapons, the Taliban have shown that they can effectively sell their message.

"They recognised that to win the war, they had to be done through narratives and stories," said Thomas Johnson, a professor at the Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey, California. "In urban areas all Afghans have smartphones, and I think it's going to be very useful. They're going to use social media to tell the Afghan people what they need to do."

Online, the Taliban will now be targeted by some of the same tactics they've employed to cement their power, just as movements like the Arab Spring and other used social media to organize and rally. Afghanistan is now communicating with the rest of the world will help the Taliban's opponents expose atrocities and drum up support for the resistance. Already, hashtags like #Don'tChangeNationalFlag are spreading with the help of internal and external support. The Taliban have responded to such calls — and to reports of crackdowns and reprisal killings by the victorious militants — with messages stressing a desire for peace

and unity. The Taliban portray Americans and other foreigners as the primary cause of years of conflict — an idea that they have emphasised by using the starting images this week from the Kabul airport.

As shots of desperate refugees clinging to planes circulated, one of the best-known pro-Taliban influencers, Qari Saefi Khoshty, struck a tone of doleful sympathy. "I cried hard to see your situation, You, the friends of the occupation, we have similarly cried for you for 20 years. We told you that Tommy Ghanvil would betray you," he wrote in a Twitter post, using slang for a person who adopts Western styles and customs to refer to Ashraf

Ghani, the Afghan president who fled this week. "We have forgiven you; I swear to Allah. We are not for this situation. Please come back to your homes."

Still, the Taliban — a group known during its 1996-2001 rule for public executions, sometimes by stoning — have largely kept their mouths shut. Taliban citizens journalists ply the streets of newly captured cities with blue-capped microphones, even as blocks of blind endorsement from residents.

"The Taliban don't need to post content to remind the population they are brutal," said Benjamin Jensen, a fellow at the Atlantic Council. "The population knows that. What they needed were images that showed they could govern the country." The Taliban have been able to post much of what they want online. Even as blocks on major social media platforms like Facebook and YouTube persist, dozens of new accounts have sprung up. The militants' efforts have focused on Twitter, where the Taliban are not directly barred.

Taliban bans co-education in Afghanistan's Herat province

DAYS AFTER VOWING to respect women's rights in Afghanistan, Taliban officials in the restive Herat province have banned co-education in government and private universities, describing it as the 'root of all evils in society.' The decision was taken after a meeting between various professors, owners of private institutions, and Taliban authorities, Khaama Press News Agency reported on Saturday.

This is the first 'fatwa' issued by the Taliban after its swift takeover of Afghanistan last week. Capital Kabul's capture on Sunday signified the end of the US's longest war, launched after the September 11, 2001 terror attacks. On Tuesday, Zabihullah Mujahid, the Taliban's long-time spokesman in his first-ever public appearance to address those concerns at a news conference, promised the Taliban would honour women's rights within the limits of Islamic law, in an effort to portray a more moderate stance.

During a three-hour meeting of university professors and owners of private educational institutions, Taliban representatives and Head of Higher Education, Afghanistan, Mullah Farid said there is no alternative and co-education must end. He also said virtuous female lecturers would be allowed to teach only female students but not the male ones. Farid called co-education the 'root of all evils in society', the report said. In the last two decades, Afghanistan has implemented a mixed system of co-education and gender-based separate classes in all universities and institutes.

India records 34,457 fresh Covid-19 cases

A SINGLE-DAY rise of 34,457 Covid-19 cases pushed India's tally to 2,32,93,286 on Saturday, while the number of active cases declined to 3,361,340, the lowest in 151 days, according to Union health ministry data. India has reported less than 50,000 daily cases for 55 consecutive days. The death toll climbed to 4,39,964 with 375 fresh fatalities, according to the data updated at 8 am.

The 3,61,340 active cases comprise 1.12% of the total infections, the lowest since March last year. The national Covid-19 recovery rate stands at 97.54%, the ministry said. In the last 26 days, according to the ministry, the weekly positivity rate stands at 1.98%. It has been below 3% for the last 57 days, the ministry said. As many as 17,21,205 Covid-19 tests were conducted on Friday, taking the total number of tests done so far in the country to 50,45,76,158. The 375 new fatalities include 105 from Maharashtra and 99 from Kerala.

Children in India, 3 other S Asian nations at extremely high risk of climate crisis impacts: UNICEF

INDIA IS AMONG FOUR South Asian countries where children are most at risk of the impacts of climate change, including their health, education, and protection, according to a new UNICEF report.

The Climate Risk Index Child Rights Crisis: Introducing the Children's Climate Risk Index (CCRI) as UNICEF's first index of children's exposure to climate and environmental shocks such as cyclones and heatwaves, as well as their vulnerability to those shocks based on their access to essential services.

Pakistan, Bangladesh, Afghanistan and India are among four South Asian countries where children are at extremely high risk of the impacts of the climate crisis, with a ranking of 14th, 15th, 23rd and 26th respectively. CCRI has ranked India one of the 33 extremely high-risk countries with flooding and air pollution being the leading environmental shocks repeated over the total number of 50,45,76,158. The 375 new fatalities include 105 from Maharashtra and 99 from Kerala.

It is estimated that more than 600 million Indians will face 'acute water shortages' in the coming years, while at the same time flash flooding is to increase significantly in the majority of India's urban areas as the global temperature increase rises above 2 degrees Celsius. Twenty-one of the world's 30 cities with the most polluted air in 2020 were in India. Dr Yasmin Ali Haque, UNICEF India Representative, said, "Climate change is a child rights crisis. The Children's Climate Risk Index data has pointed to the serious deprivations faced by children due to the intensifying effect that climate and environmental shocks have on existing inadequate access to essential services such as water and sanitation, healthcare and education."

"Understanding where and how children are uniquely vulnerable to this crisis is crucial to building our resilience and effectively addressing climate change. UNICEF hopes the findings of the report will help prioritise action to protect those most at risk and to ensure that children inherit a liveable planet." India's neighbours Nepal is ranked 51st and Sri Lanka 51st, with Bhutan is ranked 111th, with children at relatively lower risk.

Uttarakhand's herbal park inaugurated near Indo-China border

INDIA'S HIGHEST ALTITUDE herbal park situated at a height of 11,000 feet was inaugurated on Saturday at Mandak village close to the Indo-China border in Uttarakhand, officials said. Mana is the last Indian village in Chamoli bordering China and is adjacent to the famous Himalayan temple of Badrinath. The research wing of Uttarakhand's forest department has developed the park over three acres of land given

by Manu Van panchayat, under the central government's CAMPA, or Compensatory Afforestation Fund Act, scheme. The herbal park is close to 40 medicinal plants found in high altitude species found in the Himalayas region, Chief conservation officer (Research) Sanjiv Chaturvedi said. Many of these species are endangered and threatened as per the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) red list as well as the State Biodiversity Data. It includes many important medicinal herbs also, he said. The park is

divided into four sections. The first section contains species associated with Badrinath (Lodri Vishnu), which includes Badri tulsi, Badri ber, Badri tree, and sacred tree of Shojitra. Badri tulsi, which is scientifically named as Ocimum Vulgare, is found in this area and forms important part of offering to Lord Badrinath. Various researches have established its multiple medicinal

Athens is only getting hotter. Its new 'Heat Officer' hopes to cool it down

ON THE HOTTEST day of Greece's record-breaking heat wave, when temperatures in Athens rose to 111 degrees Fahrenheit and wildfires choked the air, Elin Myrivilis stopped hanging laundry on her rooftop behind the Acropolis because she could hardly breathe from the heat. "I could only breathe short, brief, shallow breaths," she said, recalling that ash from the fires also turned her black clothes white. "It was scary."

The heat's intensity (as Celsius as 44 degrees) on the August 21st, the hottest day in Athens rose to 111 degrees Fahrenheit and wildfires choked the air, Elin Myrivilis stopped hanging laundry on her rooftop behind the Acropolis because she could hardly breathe from the heat. "I could only breathe short, brief, shallow breaths," she said, recalling that ash from the fires also turned her black clothes white. "It was scary."

It is not just Greece. In recent days, a heat wave on the Italian island of Sicily appears to have resulted in the hottest recorded temperature in European history, and fires have broken out there elsewhere. A vibrant, chaotic place, would visit in the sun. Myrivilis said the conditions that make the city so challenging also made it an "interesting pilot program" for the region. Athens struggles the cultures of Europe and the Middle East, East and West, and is neither extremely rich nor poor. "It's a good city to try things out and see what works," she said. Athens, the second most densely populated city in Europe after Paris, often heats up like an oven.
